

## Jujiro: Medicine, Medical Research and Health & Social Services Tuesday 5<sup>th</sup> February 2019



After leaving FHS, Sophia Anderton received a Master's degree in Chemistry from Durham University, including a year in a research laboratory. Her first job was working for the Royal Society of Chemistry as an Assistant Editor in their research journals department. There she worked very closely with researchers from all around the world, identifying the best research for publication. Over eight years, she moved through several roles there, including managing peer review, copy-editing, commissioning and scientific ethics. She now works at the British Institute of Radiology alongside radiologists, radiographers and medical physics, supporting them in their research and CPD learning needs. She works day-to-day with doctors, medical researchers and some allied health workers.

Diana Goldin is qualified as both an Occupational Therapist and a Family & Systemic Psychotherapist. She has twenty-five years experience in the areas of paediatric neurodevelopment, mental health, eating disorders, developmental trauma, parent work and high conflict relationships in these roles. Working predominantly in the NHS, based within a multi-disciplinary team supporting children and young people and their families at a busy inner city hospital based CAMHS (Child & Adolescent Mental Health Service), her remit also includes emergency psychiatric liaison work, teaching 5th year medical students and supervision for oncology counsellors. Diana also finds time for a small private practice based in North and Central London, and is a guest lecturer for the Postgraduate Diploma and Masters Systemic Psychotherapy courses at the Tavistock and Portman NHS Trust, where she trained.





Dr Tanya Thirkell has been working as a Consultant Psychiatrist at Northwick Park hospital for twelve years. She specialised in general psychiatry and completed her postgraduate training in psychiatry in Central London hospitals. Since becoming a consultant, she has become involved in teaching medical students and has been an examiner for the Imperial College School of Medicine for the last seven years. She is also currently a Clinical Director at her hospital, which has given her a greater understanding of the everyday managing and running of our local mental health services.

Originally a medical doctor specialising in children (paediatrics), Dr Quentin Lloyd-Harris changed focus by way of an MBA degree at Harvard Business School and is now a biotechnology venture capitalist. He and his colleagues create companies where doctors and scientists can work to develop new treatments for serious diseases.
